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
By the mid 1940s, Slobodkina had matured as an artist. Albert Gallatin, an influential American collector, owned two of her paintings and she was invited to exhibit in the ground breaking *Eight by Eight* exhibition of American abstract art at the Philadelphia Museum of Art in 1945.

THE FIRST MRS. JAMES T. FARREL 1933

Influenced by abstractionist principles which grew popular in the years following the First World War, Esphyr Slobodkina became a founding member of the American Abstract Artists group and a fellow of the Federation of Modern Artists and Sculptors in the 1930s. She served the AAA as vice-president and treasurer from 1960 to 1962 and as president from 1963 to 1965. As a sculptor, painter and illustrator she was honored with several solo exhibitions.

Esphyr Slobodkina used this same enthusiasm in writing and illustrating children's books, including her most famous, *Caps for Sale*. She centered much of her later work around the premise that "color creates mood."

Making art and writing books continuously until her passing in 2002, Esphyr Slobodkina left a legacy of personal and artistic triumph.

- Born in Chelyabinsk, Siberia. Youngest of five children born to Solomon and Itta Slobodkin.
- Mother and daughters Esphyr and Tamara move to Harbin, Manchuria.
- Immigrated to New York, joining brother Ronya. Enrolls in National Academy of Design.
- Marries fellow student and tutor, Ilya Bolotowsky. They divorce in 1938.
- Joins Artists' Union and attends the Yaddo artists' colony in New York.
- Exhibits in first American Abstract Artists show as a founding member.
- Employed by the W.P.A. as a muralist. First solo exhibition at the New School for Social Research.

- Publishes her most famous children's book Caps for Sale.
- Participates in Exhibition of 31 Women, Art of this Century.
- Included in exhibition *Eight by Eight: American Abstract Art Since 1940.*
- 1953 Whitney Museum of American Art-54 acquires Composition with WhiteOvals. One person show at John
- 1958 Resident at the MacDowell Colony.
- Solo exhibition at the Hollywood Florida Art Museum.
- Retrospective at Sid Deutsch Gallery.
